







2023 Report on American Attitudes Toward the Korean Peninsula

This study on American Attitudes Toward the Korean Peninsula surveyed 1,177 Americans in August of 2023. The survey was commissioned by the Korean Economic Institute of America and conducted by YouGov.

The goal of the report is to explore perceptions of Americans on the relationship with South Korea, the challenges presented by North Korea, and how the US should manage its relationship with the peninsula. This has been explored through direct questions concerning specific trade and military alliances in the region as well as how South and North Korea more generally fit into global international relations.

YouGov surveyed 1,000 respondents who were nationally representative of adults (18+) in the US. YouGov collected an additional oversample of 177 Americans who specifically follow international news, to ensure a sample size of over 500 such respondents across the main and oversample. 316 respondents also indicate specifically following Asia-Pacific (APAC) news.

Results in this report are nationally representative unless otherwise noted on the slide. For any questions presented in this report measuring multiple countries or regions, respondents were given a predetermined list of country/regions to react to.

KEY INSIGHTS: Americans' General Views on South and North Korea

- South Korea continues to be viewed as one of the top 10 most influential countries in the world, with a rising number of Americans seeing it as influential. American views of the country are also strongly favorable (70%) - even more so among those who follow international news (87%).
- Despite its influence and favorability, a majority of Americans do not perceive South Korea as a "critical partner." Only the UK, Canada, and the EU reach this threshold, with Japan coming close. For any partner, most Americans (65%) believe it is important for America's allies to share democratic values.
- o For those who perceive Japan and South Korea as critical partners of the US, two-thirds would like to see more trilateral cooperation between the US, Japan, and South Korea, especially focused on security in the region and on economic ties. Bilaterally, over half of Americans believe that the US and South Korea should focus on security in the region, supply chain issues, and North Korea.
- o Ratings of the US administration's handling of relations with South Korea are strong, showing a significant increase to 48% this year (and 65% among Americans who follow international news).
- North Korea continues to be viewed as a critical foreign policy challenge for the US. Americans name it as one of the top three challenges,
 after China and Russia, while Iran recedes slightly this year. Ratings of the US administration's handling of relations with North Korea are low
 (26%), with more expressing disapproval than approval.



KEY INSIGHTS: Americans' Views on Trade & Military Alliance With South Korea

- Although awareness of a free trade agreement between the US and South Korea is relatively low (27%), the percent of Americans believing that trade with South Korea is beneficial grew significantly to 70% in 2023.
- Americans are increasingly engaging with exports of South Korean popular culture and entertainment. 26% of Americans now identify as a
 fan of some form of South Korean popular entertainment, such as music, television, movies, or beauty products. This represents two years of
 significant growth in this area.
- Support for the military alliance between the US and South Korea remains strong. Nearly 70% of Americans believe this alliance is in the national security interests of the US.
- 2023 showed a significant increase in the percent of Americans who would maintain the number of US troops currently in South Korea (from 48% in 2022 to 56% in 2023). An additional 10% would support increasing troop levels.
 - o In the event of a nuclear arms agreement with North Korea, a plurality of Americans would still support maintaining or increasing US troop levels in South Korea, though the percent who would call for a reduction (25%) increased significantly in 2023.
- 70% believe that East Asia is a vital region for US national security interests. While countering the rise of China has been the top US foreign policy priority in East Asia in previous years, trade and economics now rank as equally important, reflecting a significant increase in importance for this issue in 2023.
 - The percent rating the defense of friends and allies in East Asia as the most important priority decreased to 24% in 2023. This may be linked to awareness of the costs of such alliances based on recent experience in Ukraine.

KEY INSIGHTS: Americans' Views on the North Korea Challenge

- o In general, there is decreasing support for any country to maintain nuclear weapons capabilities.
- Regarding North Korea's nuclear weapons capability, American attitudes have remained stable for several years. Nearly 90% Americans think
 it is important that North Korea give up its nuclear weapons program. But Americans do not think that relations with North Koreas should
 focus exclusively on nuclear weapons.
 - 84% believe that the US should push for human rights improvements in North Korea.
 - A plurality (48%) believe that the US should provide humanitarian or civilian assistance to North Korean citizens.
 - Half of Americans support normalizing relations with North Korea and discussing issues other than denuclearization, even if North Korea refuses to give up its nuclear weapons capability.



AMERICANS' GENERAL VIEWS ON SOUTH & NORTH KOREA


Over four in ten of all Americans view South Korea as a "partner" of the US and would like to see the two countries coordinate more on issues such as security in East Asia and the Indo-Pacific, supply chains, and North Korea. China and Russia continued to be viewed as the most critical foreign policy challenge to the US.

The US continues to be viewed as the most influential nation in the world. 43% of respondents see South Korea as a very/fairly influential nation in the world. This rate has increased significantly since 2022.

Q1: How influential do you think the following country or region is in the world? *Respondents were provided a predetermined list of countries and regions to choose from for this question.*





4 in 10 Americans See South Korea as a Critical Partner

In 2023, the UK, Canada, and the EU continued to be most likely to be called "critical partners" of the US. 41% of respondents called South Korea a "critical partner" to the US, compared to 45% in 2022, however this decrease was not significant.






Over half of Americans would like to see the US and South Korea cooperate on security, supply chains, and North Korea.


Almost 2 in 3 Americans who view South Korea and Japan as critical partners believe the US should exercise more trilateral cooperation. They advocate that this cooperation should be deepened within the areas of security, supply chains, and development of international trade rules.










China, Russia, and North Korea continue to rank as the most critical foreign policy challenges to the US. Compared to last year, with Iran receding slightly compared to 2022.

Countries/Regions Representing the Most Critical Foreign Policy Challenges to the US












sec_council_add_2023: The United Nations Security Council currently has five permanent members that have veto power: the United States, the United Kingdom, France, Russia, and the People's Republic of China. If the Security Council were to add two additional permanent members, which two countries should it add? *Select up to two*.

The overall opinion of South Korea remains highly favorable (70%), which is consistent with opinions in previous years. Among those who follow international or APAC news, favorability is at or near 90%.



Overall Opinion of South Korea







Among Americans, there is a significant increase in approval of the current administration's handling of relations with South Korea, which has risen steadily since 2021. Nearly 2 in 3 who follow international news express this approval.











More than half of Americans have a very unfavorable overall opinion of North Korea, an increase from 2022. The view is even more negative among those who are interested in international or APAC news.



Overall Opinion of North Korea








Approval of the current US administration's handling of relations with North Korea remained low compared to approval of its handling of relations with South Korea. Among those who follow international news, approval of the US administration's handling of North Korea went up.












AMERICANS' VIEWS ON TRADE WITH SOUTH KOREA

Almost 30% of Americans are aware of the free trade agreement between South Korea and the US. 70% of Americans see trade with South Korea as beneficial to the US. A quarter of Americans identify as fans of popular entertainment or beauty products from South Korea, reflecting multi-year growth in this area.

Canada, Mexico, and the United Kingdom continue to lead as countries Americans believe the US has a free trade agreement with. 27% of Americans are aware of the free trade agreement with South Korea, a rate that remains stable since 2022.














Awareness among Americans of a US-South Korea free trade agreement remains stable compared to 2022.



Views on Trade Between US and South Korea









The percent of Americans identifying as fans of Korean movies showed year on year growth for two years. A quarter of Americans now identify as fans of at least one type of popular entertainment or beauty product from South Korea.


AMERICANS' VIEWS ON MILITARY ALLIANCE WITH SOUTH KOREA

Nearly seven in ten Americans believe the US military alliance with South Korea is in the national security interests of the US. The number of Americans who would like to see the US increase or maintain current troop presence in South Korea rose to 66% in this wave.

Nearly 7 in 10 Americans believe the US military alliance with South Korea is in the national security interests of the US. This support significantly increased from 2022 among those interested in national news or APAC news, with almost 9 in 10 viewing this alliance as beneficial to the US.







Q17. Do you believe the US military alliance with South Korea is in the national security interests of the US or do you not feel this way?



Q11. Which comes closest to how you feel about current US military alliances?


More than half of Americans would like to see the US maintain its current troop presence in South Korea, an increase from 2022.

Views on US Troops in South Korea





46% of Americans would support maintaining or increasing troop levels in South Korea if a nuclear arms agreement were reached with North Korea. 30% would support a reduction or withdrawal, representing a significant increase from 2022.










Q29. If the United States were to reach an agreement with North Korea to give up its nuclear weapons, should the US change its troop presence in South Korea?

7 in 10 Americans believe East Asia is a vital region for the US. The rate is even higher among international news and APAC followers.












2023 showed a significant increase in the percent of Americans who believe trade and economics is the most important interest for the US in East Asia. This is now tied with countering the rise of China as the top priority. The percent naming the defense of US friends and allies as the most important interest decreased significantly to 24% in 2023.



Most Important US National Interest in East Asia






Q28b. What do you believe to be the most important interest for the United States in East Asia?

8 in 10 Americans who follow international news or APAC news believe the US should assist South Korea in the event of a cyber-attack from North Korea or China, compared to 6 in 10 among the general US public.














AMERICANS' VIEWS ON THE NORTH KOREA CHALLENGE

In 2023, nearly 90% of Americans think it is important for North Korea to give up its nuclear weapons, and there is a significant increase in Americans who believe that no country should have military nuclear capabilities. Half of Americans think the US should engage with North Korea on issues other than denuclearization, regardless of its willingness to give up nuclear weapons.

Almost 90% of Americans believe it is important for North Korea to give up its military nuclear capabilities, a percent which has remained stable since 2021.










Q22. In your opinion, how important is it that North Korea give up its military nuclear capabilities?


Almost half of Americans believe that no country should have military nuclear capabilities, an increase from 2022.

8% of Americans believe North Korea should maintain its military nuclear capabilities.












More than 8 in 10 Americans believe it is important that the US pushes for human rights improvements in North Korea. This sentiment is similar among those who are interested in international news or APAC news.











Q23. And how important is it that the US pushes for human rights improvements in North Korea?


